
The Adaptation List includes the 61 novels that were mentioned multiple times.


# Age of Vice




### S.A. Cosby

Charon is Titus's home and his heart. But where faith and violence meet, there will be a reckoning.




# **American Marriage**







# Beneath a Scarlet Sky



## **Beyond That, The Sea**


### Laura Spence Ash




# **Big Swiss**


# **Black Water Rising**


# The Boy With a Bird in His Chest


### The Bullet Swallower


## **Carrie Soto is Back**


# **Chain Gang All-Stars**


### Counterfeit






# Demon Copperhead

popular culture where even the superheroes have abandoned rural people in favor of cities.






### **Great Circle**




#### Emma Cline




## The Historian




### Luster




## Martyr!



Her only ally in this inhospitable abode is the family's youngest son. Shy and gentle, he seems to want to help Noemí, but might also be hiding dark knowledge of his family's past. For there are many secrets behind the walls of High Place. The family's once colossal wealth and faded mining empire kept them from prying eyes, but as Noemí digs deeper she unearths stories of violence and madness.

And Noemí, mesmerized by the terrifying yet seductive world of High Place, may soon find it impossible to ever leave this enigmatic house behind.




### **Middlesex**

The astonishing tale of a gene that passes down through three generations of a Greek-American family and flowers in the body of a teenage girl.

"I was born twice: first, as a baby girl, on a remarkably smogless Detroit day of January 1960; and then again, as a teenage boy, in an emergency room near Petoskey, Michigan, in August of 1974. . . My birth certificate lists my name as Calliope Helen Stephanides. My most recent driver's license…records my first name simply as Cal."

So begins the breathtaking story of Calliope Stephanides and three generations of the Greek-American Stephanides family who travel from a tiny village overlooking Mount Olympus in Asia Minor to Prohibition-era Detroit, witnessing its glory days as the Motor City, and the race riots of 1967, before they move out to the tree-lined streets of suburban Grosse Pointe, Michigan. To understand why Calliope is not like other girls, she has to uncover a guilty family secret and the astonishing genetic history that turns Callie into Cal, one of the most audacious and wondrous narrators in contemporary fiction.




### The Monsters of Templeton

# My Sister the Serial Killer


### Oyinkan Braithwaite


# **The Night Circus**

# **Night Film**



The last time he got close to exposing the director, McGrath lost his marriage and his career. This time, he might lose even more.




### **North Woods**


## Prep




## The Rachel Incident

### S.A. Cosby


Ike Randolph has been out of jail for fifteen years, with not so much as a speeding ticket in all that time. But a Black man with cops at the door knows to be afraid.




# The Safekeep


## Salvage the Bones




### The Sellout

# Sky Full of Elephants


### Cebo Campbell

Heading south toward what is now called the Kingdom of Alabama, everything Charlie and Sidney thought they knew about themselves, and the world, will be turned upside down.




### **State of Wonder**






# A Tale for the Time Being

# Tomorrow and Tomorrow and Tomorrow






### **Trust**

to have read. Yet there are other versions of this tale of privilege and deceit.




# Twelve Lives of Samuel Hawley




## The Verifiers




# **We Ride Upon Sticks**




# The Wedding People




# When We Were Sisters

Now, however, Martin feels he can no longer keep his identity a secret; he wants Kelly to help him ignite a controversy that will help sell racial reassignment surgery to the world. Inventive and thought-provoking, Your Face in Mine is a brilliant novel about cultural and racial alienation and the nature of belonging in a world where identity can be a stigma or a lucrative brand.
